

Christo and Jeanne-Claude:

Environmental Artists

If you think art is something you see only in museums, you'll soon change your mind. Read this article about Christo and Jeanne-Claude, creators of art in the environment.

ook quickly if you want to see the work of artists Christo and ✓ Jeanne-Claude. This married couple has created art together for more than forty years. Their sculptures aren't **permanent**. In fact, after years of planning, their works may last only a few weeks.

Christo and Jeanne-Claude use fabric, or cloth, as a form of art. The flat, **formless** fabric has no shape. It takes on the **dimensions** —the height, width, and length of the object it wraps.

Some art is realistic and shows a person or an object that you can recognize. Some art is abstract. The art of Christo and Jeanne-Claude is environmental. Its beauty lies in how it fits into the world around it.

These artists use synthetic cloth, not natural fabric, to create amazing effects. Wrapped trees look like huge lollipops with

irregular edges, rather than smooth, even ones. Wrapped rocks along a coast shimmer, gently shining with sea spray.

One of their best known works is called Running Fence. They hung 24½ miles of white fabric on more than 2,000 steel poles across northern California. Miles of cloth **billowed** in the wind. In contrast to cloth that is not lit by any light source, the fluttering fabric was luminous as it reflected the sunlight. The project took almost four years to finish, but removal began two weeks after it was done.

Christo and Jeanne-Claude don't sell their projects. They sell drawings of their art and early works, instead. They pay for their projects with their own money. When a display is taken down, the art site is returned to its natural state and the materials are recycled.

Context Clues Strategy

Look for Words That Mean the Opposite

EXAMPLE: Lines that are *horizontal*, rather than lines that run top to bottom, have been shown to have a calming effect.

CLUE: The words *rather than* give a clue. Lines that run *top to bottom* are the opposite of *horizontal* lines. Horizontal lines go across, from one side to another.

Here is another strategy for using context clues to understand the meaning of the word *irregular* from the article on page 116.

Read the sentence with the unknown word and some of the sentences around it.

Wrapped trees look like huge lollipops with **irregular** edges, rather than smooth, even ones.

PLook for context clues. What Words That Mean the Opposite can you find?

The words *rather than* are a clue. The words *smooth* and *even* are the opposite of *irregular*.

Think about the context clues and other information you may already know.

A lollipop has smooth, even, rounded edges. A tree wrapped in cloth would have uneven edges.

Predict a meaning for the word irregular.

The word irregular must mean "not smooth or even."

Check the dictionary to be sure of the meaning.

The word *irregular* means "not evenly shaped or arranged; uneven."

Recycling Around the World

Young people throughout the United States are worried about the environment. They are not alone. School children around the world are doing their part to protect Earth. The whole world looks better without trash lying around.

hana is in Africa. Students there helped clean up their school grounds. They picked up trash and sorted it. They made sure the plastic, metal, and paper trash were placed in the **correct** bins so they could be recycled. The students placed trash cans around the school as a **direct** way to prevent littering. They also drew posters to **illustrate** the need to recycle.

Prince Edward Island is in Canada. Students there also collected and recycled trash. They **erected** a bulletin board for messages about caring for Earth. To spread this message, they chose the **format** of classroom visits. Pairs of students went to each class to explain how to recycle. The students also planted flower beds. The **formation** of the beds discourages students from walking across the lawns.

Nova Scotia is another area in Canada. One school there had a **rectangular** strip of unused land that was divided into **uniform** sections. Each section was given to a class. The classes grew plants native to the area and other plants that attract birds. Some gardens also included edible plants.

São Paulo is in Brazil. A river passes in front of a school there. Students studied an area of land along this river. They learned about its soil. Then they helped choose native trees that would grow there. The students wanted the trees to grow straight and healthy, not **deformed** or sick. They attended workshops to learn how to care for the trees. Then they helped plant 800 new trees.

Hungary is in Europe. Students there learned that lime trees once grew in their village, but they all died. The young people started a replanting project. In the end, they helped plant 419 trees and bushes. Lime trees now grow in their village again.

Young people around the world are working to protect Earth. When they talk about their projects, enthusiasm **illuminates** their faces. They want a cleaner and healthier world. They are willing to work to make it that way.

The Look of Fall:

Falling Colors

Do the trees change color every fall where you live? Have you admired the yellow, red, orange, and purple leaves that grace the trees when the weather turns cooler? Do you know why those leaves are no longer green?

The color change of fall leaves is triggered by shorter days and cooler temperatures. But the bright colors that appear in the leaves are not a **discoloration**. Those colors were there all along. They were covered up by a green pigment called chlorophyll. This pigment helps plants make their food. However, chlorophyll is **fragile**. It breaks down easily. The leaves must keep producing more of it. This process requires sunlight and warmth.

When autumn arrives, the leaves can no longer produce as much chlorophyll. However, the leaves still have other pigments. Xanthophyll is a yellow pigment. It is more **sturdy** than chlorophyll. It does not break down as easily. Leaves with little chlorophyll and lots of xanthophyll are a **vivid** yellow.

Another pigment, called anthocyanin, causes the red and purple

in leaves. This pigment also makes apples red and grapes purple. Some kinds of trees, such as red oaks and red maples, produce a large amount of this pigment. They are very **decorative** in the fall, turning bright red and purple.

Some leaves have a pigment called carotene. In the fall, it makes the leaves turn orange. Carotene, along with xanthophyll, also makes carrots orange.

Leaf color is greatly affected by the weather. Low temperatures increase the anthocyanin in leaves, so maples turn bright red. Still, an early frost can cause a paler red. The best **clarity** of color results when dry, sunny days are followed by cool, dry nights. Too much rain or hot weather can cause the leaves to turn a murky color. Some leaves, such as those on oak trees, turn a **drab** brown every year. In fact, oak leaves do not drop in the fall. They can provide a dense cover for birds until new leaves start to grow in the spring.

As you travel through the country, the bright colors of fall seem to be random, not **geometric**. However, each color change has a specific cause. The changing colors are one more amazing part of Mother Nature's plan.


Pronunciation and Phonetic Respellings Every dictionary entry includes a phonetic respelling. The phonetic respelling tells you how to pronounce the word correctly. The phonetic respelling also shows which syllable to stress (say with the most force). In words with several syllables, more than one syllable may be stressed.

Some dictionaries show the syllable with the primary stress (the most emphasis) in boldface with a boldfaced stress mark. The syllable with the next amount of stress is shown with a stress mark that is not boldfaced.

If a word has two correct pronunciations, both pronunciations will be shown. The first respelling shows the preferred way to pronounce the word.


